The 2016 General Assembly is down to it's final days. The budget bill has yet to be negotiated and a number of major issues have yet to be finalized. KACCS is working on a number of issues including SB 140, the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA). The bill authorizes the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education to enter

New EMT Program Addresses Regions Critical Shortages

Students in Eastern Kentucky who are considering careers as first responders will now have a new option available to them for training to become certified emergency medical technicians (EMT). In response to the critical shortage of EMTs in Eastern Kentucky, the American National University (ANU) Pikeville campus will begin offering an emergency medical technician diplo-

ma program this spring. The program has been developed with support and input from the area's first responder community, including Cyrus Hess, a veteran of the field who is serving as the program's director.

The EMT diploma program will qualify graduates to take the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians' (NREMT) EMT examination. As a certified EMT, graduates

from the program will be prepared for entry-level employment working for police, fire and rescue squads; private ambulance services; and hospitals. After graduating from the EMT program, students then have the opportunity to continue their education in the ANU paramedic program, which the campus launched in 2015.

Dustin Reynolds, a student in the ANU para-

medic program, enjoys serving his community as an EMT working for Trans-Star Ambulance service. "I've always wanted to help people and I don't like sitting still. I love being where the action is," Dustin said.



KACCS Symposium Attendance Sets New Attendance Record

More than 100 higher education professionals from 23 campuses across the Commonwealth took advantage of the opportunity to attend the KACCS Symposium in March setting a new record attendance for this event.
